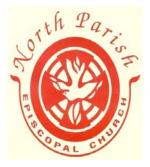

## A Letter from Bishop Sean

March 16, 2016

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ:

The spring meeting of the House of Bishops concluded yesterday and I am grateful to have had a time of retreat and collegial reflection with so many colleagues and friends. At the close of our meeting, those of us gathered--137 bishops from across the Episcopal Church--unanimously approved a statement expressing our concern about the current political climate in the United States.

Extremism and violent rhetoric have become far too common in this election season. As people of faith, we must resist these forces of fear and division no matter what our party affiliations or political persuasions. In that spirit, I ask that this statement from the House of Bishops be read and distributed in every congregation in the Diocese of Bethlehem this Sunday. I also encourage you to share it on your congregation's social media channels.

#### A Word to the Church

Holy Week 2016

On Good Friday the ruling political forces of the day tortured and executed an innocent man. They sacrificed the weak and the blameless to protect their own status and power. On the third day Jesus was raised from the dead, revealing not only their injustice but also unmasking the lie that might makes right.

In a country still living under the shadow of the lynching tree, we are troubled by the violent forces being released by this season's political rhetoric. Americans are turning against their neighbors, particularly those on the margins of society. They seek to secure their own safety and security at the expense of others. There is legitimate reason to fear where this rhetoric and the actions arising from it might take us.

In this moment, we resemble God's children wandering in the wilderness. We, like they, are struggling to find our way. They turned from following God and worshiped a golden calf constructed from their own wealth. The current rhetoric is leading us to construct a modern false idol out of power and privilege. We reject the idolatrous notion that we can ensure the safety of some by sacrificing the hopes of others. No matter where we fall on the political spectrum, we must respect the dignity of every human being and we must seek the common good above all else.

We call for prayer for our country that a spirit of reconciliation will prevail and we will not betray our true selves.

Please join me in praying for our leaders and our nation during this fractious time.

## VESTRY MEETING HIGHLIGHTS March 20, 2016

**Combined meeting with Schuylkill County Vestries** – The next meeting will be held April 4<sup>th</sup> at 7 p.m. at St. James, Schuylkill Haven. Discussed at the first meeting was what each church does for outreach, evangelism and ideas on how we can help one another.

**Geisinger Blood Drive** - A Geisinger Blood Drive will take place at Holy Apostles on May 16<sup>th</sup> from 2 – 7 p.m. Kathy Burda suggested Holy Apostles to be used for the drive. Parishioners are asked to donate baked goods and other items and should be at the church in the morning. Our goal is twenty-five people and twenty pints of blood.

**Pilgrimage Regional Meeting** – Anyone interested in attending the Pilgrimage Regional Meeting at St. Luke's Lebanon, May 7th, from 10 a.m. until 12 p.m. should contact Bonnie Baker.

**Devotional - Baptism –** Fr. Jim Smith will baptize Adalynn Eckrode, child of Raylene Brill and Albert Eckrode, at HA on June 18<sup>th</sup>.

**Property – Holy Apostles** – The mechanisms in the organ are going. We continue to play the organ until it goes, replacing the motors as needed. Approximately sixteen shingles from the rood were picked up in the yard. We will get two estimates to have the roof repaired or replaced. We will apply for a grant in the fall. **St. John's** – We will have a plaque made for the memorials we are using to have the paving done. The plaque will be placed inside the church before the exit to the parking lot. The paving will begin in April.

HA hall could be rented to increase our revenues. The entrance needs to be made handicapped accessible. Bids will be secured.

**Fund Raising -** Soup Sale will be held at Saint John's on April 16th, from 10:00 a.m. until sell out. Price - \$7.00 per quart. Bonnie Hynoski and Elaine Ulceski will chair this event. A Strawberry Festival will be held at HA on June 15<sup>th</sup> from 6 to 8 p.m.

#### **NEWS FROM MARION C. PRICE TRUST FUND**

**Artificial sweeteners and other sugar substitutes** are found in a variety of food and beverages; they're marked as "sugar-free" or "diet", including soft drinks, chewing gum, jellies, baked goods, candy, fruit juice, ice cream and yogurt.

Artificial sweeteners are attractive alternatives to sugar because they add virtually no calories to your diet or contribute to tooth decay and cavities. In addition, you need only a fraction compared with the amount of sugar you would normally use for sweetness.

Artificial sweeteners have been scrutinized intensely for decades. But according to the national Cancer Institute and other health agencies, there's no sound scientific evidence that any of the artificial sweeteners approved for use in the U.S. cause cancer or other serious health problems.

Sugar alcohols are one type of reduced-calorie sweetener. You can find them in ice creams, cookies, puddings, candies and chewing gum that is labeled as "sugar-free" or "no sugar added". Sugar alcohols provide fewer calories than sugar and have less of an effect on blood glucose (blood sugar) than other carbohydrates. Even though they are called sugar alcohols, they do not contain alcohol.

When you are considering foods with low or reduced calorie sweeteners, always check the Nutrition Facts on the label. Many of the food products containing these types of sweeteners still have a significant amount of carbohydrates, calories and fat, so never consider them a "free food" without checking the label. By comparing the calories in the sugar-free version to the regular version, you'll see whether you are really getting fewer calories.

Some natural sweeteners you may consider: honey, maple syrup, agave nectar, fruit juice and molasses. You should still consider using these in moderation because like sugar, they contain a lot of sugar with little or no nutritive value.

**Depression in the Elderly.** Depression is a true and treatable medical condition, not a normal part of aging. However, older adults are at increased risk of experiencing depression. Depression is more common in people who also have other illnesses (such as heart disease or cancer) or whose function becomes limited.

Causes may be physical, social or psychological in origin including:

- Specific events in a person's life, such as the death of a spouse, a change in circumstances or a health problem that limits activities and mobility
- Medical conditions Parkinson's Disease, hormonal disorders, heart disease or thyroid problems
- Chronic pain
- Nutritional deficiencies
- Genetic predisposition to the condition
- Chemical imbalance in the brain

Someone who is depressed has feelings of sadness or anxiety that last for weeks at a time. He or she may also experience:

- Feelings of hopelessness &/or pessimism
- Feelings of guilt, worthlessness &/or helplessness
- Irritability, restlessness
- Loss of interest in activities or hobbies once pleasurable
- Fatigue; and deceased energy
- Difficulty concentrating or remembering details and making decisions
- Insomnia; early morning wakefulness or excessive sleeping
- Overeating or appetite loss
- Thoughts of suicide, suicide attempts
- Persistent aches or pains, headaches, cramps or digestive problems that do not get better, even with treatment.

Most adults see an improvement in their symptoms when treated with antidepressant drugs, psychotherapy or a combination of both. If you are concerned about a loved one being depressed, offer to go with him or her to see a health care provider to be diagnosed and treated.

#### If you or someone you care about is in crises, please seek help immediately.

- Visit a nearby emergency department or your health care provider's office.
- Call the toll-free, 24-hour hotline of the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline at 1-800-273-TALK (1-800-273-8255) to talk with a trained counselor.

Some strategies for fighting depression and loneliness:

- 1. **State of mind** Challenge yourself to replace negative thinking with positive thinking. Increase your happy thoughts by reading funny newspaper cartoons or watching a funny television program or movie.
- 2. **Hobby** Hobbies are a great way to combine staying busy and doing something you love.
- 3. **Routine enjoyment** Whether reading a book or playing a game, take time to do something you love every day.
- 4. **Exercise** Exercise is a great way to help you cure depression. Exercise naturally increases the release of endorphins which helps makes you feel good.
- 5. **Diet** Eat a well-balanced diet with fruit, vegetables and whole grain foods, which can help increase the neurotransmitters in our brains, most commonly associated with mood.
- 6. **Meditation** Meditation can help you find an inner peace within yourself and help you think about people and situations in a more relaxed way.
- 7. **Be Thankful** –Instead of thinking about the people and things we do not have in our lives, be grateful for all that we do have.
- 8. **Volunteer** Knowing you have made a difference in a person's life can give you a sense of purpose. Even if you are unable to leave your house there are plenty of volunteer activities that you can do call Kathy Burda at 570-621-3220 for more information.
- 9. **Join a Social Group** –There are many types of groups and clubs to choose from.
- 10. **Get help** Recovering from depression is not easy to overcome on your own. Know when you need help and seek a friend, family member or professional for assistance.

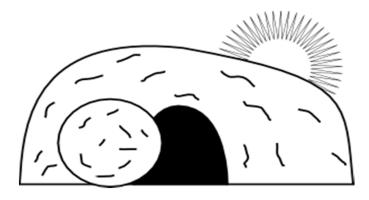
