

From Fr. Tim's Desk

"Yes, LORD, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table." Matthew 15:27

Did you ever have a bad day? Maybe you're having one right now. One of those days that you're just plain tired and cranky and ready to bite someone's head off. All you want to do is just retreat from the world and be left alone and enjoy some peace and quiet. It seems that Jesus might have been having one of those days in Matthew's account of his encounter with a Canaanite woman. He just learned that his cousin John the Baptist has been murdered by King Herod and he just wanted to get away and be able to rest and grieve so he left Israel and headed north to Phoenicia. He retreated to a small house along the coast to be alone with his disciples and even there he couldn't rest. The Canaanite woman approached him and shouted "Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David;" but he ignored her. She kept on shouting and his disciples pressed him to send her away. Finally, he told her I am not here for YOU. She knelt and cried "Lord help me". Jesus insulted her calling her a dog. She pressed on. "Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table."

Was it Jesus the man or Jesus the Son of God having the exchange? If it was Jesus the man then it was in that tired, and exasperated and hostile exchange of words that Jesus the man had a learning moment. Because of this woman's tenacity and boldness on the behalf of her child he came to the realization that his ministry as the Messiah might include everyone, not just his own Jewish brothers and sisters. If it was Jesus the Son of God having the exchange then Jesus knew exactly what he was doing when he left Israel and traveled into Gentile territory. It wasn't to get away and rest and it wasn't by accident. He ventured into Phoenicia to show his disciples that the Messiah was sent by God for all nations of the world, and that his grace and mercy were not limited only to the children of Israel.

Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ has his feet planted firmly in two worlds. He lived and died as one of us and took on our human nature. He was fully human and yet he is fully God. We too have our feet planted firmly in two worlds. We are human with all of our frailties and imperfections and we have bad days, but we are also children of God, heirs to an eternal kingdom. God's grace and mercy has been freely bestowed upon all of us whether we deserve it or not.

If someone were to chronicle a day in the life of one of us, what would they write? Would they write a story about our human nature, about how we had neat, cozy, clear cut boundaries in our lives? Would they write that we were too absorbed in ourselves and didn't really bother with anyone that we thought beneath us? Would they write that it was just too inconvenient to help the poor and needy and those less fortunate than ourselves and that our pride strangled our compassion and mercy? OR, would they write about a child of God? Would they write about someone who treated everybody with respect and reached out in love and compassion to all those who needed it? Would they write about someone who acknowledged that they had done nothing to earn God's grace and mercy and were ever mindful about how that grace and mercy was shared with others? Would they write about someone, who even when they were having a bad day, shared the bread from the masters table?

NEWS FROM MARION C PRICE TRUST FUND

Summertime is a time of fun and relaxation for most people. But for seniors, the heat and sun can be dangerous if the proper precautions aren't taken. On hot days, elderly skin is not able to produce sweat and cool the body as efficiently as younger skin. Some medications can hinder the body's ability to regulate temperatures. Here are some tips that the elderly and their care givers can use to have a safe summer.

- 1. Stay hydrated. Seniors are more susceptible to dehydration because we lose our ability to conserve water as we age & become less aware of thirst. Limit tea, coffee and alcohol in hot weather.
- 2. Replace electrolytes. Drink liquids that contain salt and potassium.
- 3. Keep your cool. Have air conditioners and fans available for those hot days. If able, go to the mall, movies or grocery store on extremely hot days. Or call Trinity Church Office at 570-622-8720 to make arrangements to come in to the air conditioning.
- 4. Stay in touch. Check in with friends and family or make arrangements for them to check in with you.
- 5. Know who to call. Prepare a list of emergency phone numbers and place them in an accessible area.
- 6. Wear the right stuff. When it's warm outside wear neutral colored, natural light weight fabrics.
- 7. Protect your eyes. Wearing sunglasses when outside can protect your eyes from harmful UV rays and preserve your vision.
- 8. Know the signs of heat stress. Be sure to get medical attention if you experience any of the following: hot or dry skin, paleness, rapid heart rate, muscle cramps, nausea & vomiting, disorientation & confusion, delirium, fainting or coma, and worsening of medical conditions. If you or an elderly loved one starts to feel any of these symptoms, seek medical help, get out of the heat, lie down and place ice packs on your body.
- 9. Rub on sunscreen and wear hats. Everyone should use sunscreen when outdoors. If you have been using the same bottle of sunscreen for a few years, recycle it and get a new one. After the expiration dates the ingredients degrade and aren't as effective. Be sure it protects against UVA and UVB radiation. In addition to the term "broad spectrum" you should select a sunscreen with a sunprotection factor (SPF) of at least 30 SPF. Reapply all sunscreen at least every 2 hours.
- 10. Apply bug spray when outside. The elderly are particularly prone to West Nile Virus and Encephalitis.
- 11. Exercise smart. If you enjoy outdoor activities such as walking or gardening, make sure to wear the proper clothing and protective gear. Do not stay out for long periods of time and consider going out early in the morning or later in the evening when the sun is not at its peak.

Blueberries & strawberries are in season. They contain a substance that can help dilate arteries, which fights plaque buildup. This antioxidant power helps fight inflammation in the cardiovascular system, strengthens cells and increases oxygen levels in the body. This can have a positive effect on brain health.
