Musings from the priest's computer....

For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: Ecclesiastes 3:1

It seems I was purchasing ice melt for the walkways just yesterday, and now, I was looking to bring home a bag of Miracle Grow-Enhanced Potting Soil. I unrolled my Green Stole last week, but was hesitating about rolling up and stashing away my white one. It seems that Lent passed quickly. And then the Easter season was gone in a flash. The Paschal Candle had been a focus of lightness and joy in Easter, but now it is back, unlit, where it belongs for Ordinary Time.

I think it is strange that we call this season after Pentecost "Ordinary Time" though there are some Sundays after Christmas and before Lent which are also "Ordinary Time". And because of this, this is now the 6th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Proper 6, but the 3rd Sunday after Pentecost. Ordinary does not mean dull or boring in this case, however. It refers to the ordinal numbers, as in 1st, 2nd, 3rd, etc., rather than cardinal numbers, as in, one, two, three, four. It has been suggested also that these times of ordinariness also signal when Christ lived among us ordinary folks, working, ministering, teaching and loving. This year, Year A, we will hear the many events recounted by the Gospel of Matthew.

Ordinary time is a special time of the church year, when we are called to live more fully into the faith we express and nourish, becoming alive in the ordinariness of life itself. Ordinary time in the Church also focuses on the entirety of our faith, not only the anticipation associated with Advent or Lent, or the peaceful Brilliance of Christmas, or the Extraordinary Joy of Easter. Ordinary time is a special time to seek new ministry, research burning questions of theology, and learn nuances of our Christian faith.

I pray in the rush of this summer that you take some time to consider how you can be more active in your faith, and what you can explore more fully and how you can strengthen your prayer life to live more fully into your Baptismal promises. Remember, Advent is just around the corner.....



<u>Summer Safety Tips</u>

As we are spending more time outdoors this summer season, there are a few things to keep in mind to stay safe. Remember hats, sunglasses, and sunscreen to protect your skin and eyes from harmful UV rays. As summer temperatures rise so does the risk of heat related illness- especially dehydration. The risk of dehydration is particularly high for those over age 65. Age, diet, illness and medications are among the many reasons why elders suffer from dehydration.

Seniors are more susceptible to heat-related illnesses and injury, according to the Centers for Disease Control. When we age, our bodies become less efficient at regulating temperature because older adults do not sweat as much as younger adults, and sweat is the most important heat-regulating mechanism. Older adults also store fat differently, which can further complicate heat regulation in the body. As outside temperatures rise, so does the body's internal temperature. This is why seniors suffer heat stroke more often than younger people.

Staying indoors, preferably in air conditioning, when the sun is strongest (10 am-4 pm) will keep your body from having to work extra hard at maintaining a normal body temperature. Try dressing in loose-fitting and lightweight clothes in natural, breathable fabrics like cotton. Dress in light colors that will reflect the sun and heat instead of dark colors that will attract them. Some medications can cause increased sensitivity to the sun. Talk to your doctor about sun or heat related side effects of your current medications. Stay hydrated by drinking more fluids especially water. Watermelon is more than 90% water and a great tasting way to replace lost fluids.

Most importantly, look for any signs of heat related illnesses such as dehydration, heat stroke, heat exhaustion, etc. Signs to look for may include disorientation, dry skin, excessive tiredness, headache, lethargy, nausea, a flushed face, high body temperature, rapid pulse, dizziness and confusion. Seek medical attention for treatment.

Stay hydrated, stay cool, stay safe and enjoy your summer!
