The Evangelist John wrote his account of the life of Jesus after the other 3 synoptic evangelists. There is some understanding that he did not use Mark, Luke, or Matthew as points of reference, as his account was written much later than the other 3 Gospel accounts. John's Gospel revolves around signs in his Gospel. And through those signs that John details, we are to come to faith in Jesus. The signs all involve other humans and their associated questions or difficulties or maladies. In that context, they entered Jesus's life so Jesus could become a blessing for them, and also to become blessings and lessons for us. John's Gospel is then a retelling of the story of John and his encounters with this Rabboni, Jesus of Nazareth.

I have observed something that is uniquely Episcopalian: the telling and retelling of our personal journey of faith in the context of this branch of Christianity. We recount where and how God called us into this church, and what the church has done for us. In addition, portions of our personal faith journey include what we have done for this church to uplift, to minister, and to participate. We then are the blessings for others, as they are to us. And because we are responsible in some measure for each other, we can often recount when and where and also by whom we have been taught lessons.

Spring will shorten the shadows of winter, and lighten our lives with the beauty of creation. Summer will pass quickly, leading us to wonder where time went. Yet, summer, with its lengthening of days and daylight, could be a perfect time to take hold of opportunities to become a blessing to others. A simple phone call, a note telling another they are in your prayers, or even a pot of flowers or a plate of goodies can brighten the life of those we see at church. These simple actions while days stretch into weeks can also teach others the lesson that we are our siblings' keepers. All these add to our own faith journeys and to those of others.



NEWS FROM MARION C. PRICE

I recently attended an AED training at my home church. The church purchased an AED or Automated External Defibrillator for our sanctuary a few months ago. This purchase was prompted by an event that took place at another church in our charge. During a Sunday worship service, a member had a medical event. It was not a cardiac arrest, but prompted discussion as to what our plan would be if it happened in our church. After some discussion it was decided that we would purchase an AED, primarily because of the wait time for EMS service at our rural location. In addition to the AED training, the Stroke/ Chest Pain Coordinator from Lehigh Valley Hospital supplied some information on strokes. This young lady had a very interesting presentation. Just as with a heart attack, an important factor in stroke recovery is time. As explained to us, the best chance of having recovery from a stroke is treatment within 4 hours. Think of a stroke as a "brain attack" and just like a heart attack, it needs immediate medical attention.

A stroke occurs when a blood vessel in the brain is either blocked by a clot or bursts. In minutes, brain cells begin to die. This can cause lasting brain damage, disability or even death. There are three different types of strokes.

Ischemic strokes occur when there is a blockage in a blood vessel in your brain, keeping it from getting the blood and oxygen it needs to function. This is also the most common type of stroke. **Hemorrhagic** strokes are less common, but can occur when a weakened blood vessel in your brain bursts or leaks blood. The blood builds up and puts pressure on the brain and causes damage. A **TIA** (transient ischemic attack), sometimes called a "mini stroke," is usually caused by a blood clot. While symptoms of a TIA usually only last a few minutes it is still a medical emergency and a warning sign that a major stroke may occur.

The signs of a stroke come on suddenly and learning to spot a stroke quickly can save lives. People who are having a stroke may not realize what is happening to them or may choose to ignore the signs. Acting quickly may prevent or reduce brain damage and lifelong disability.

BE FAST is the new acronym for spotting a stroke.

BALANCE -Watch for sudden loss of balance

EYES - Check for vision loss

FACE - Look for an uneven smile

ARM - Check to see if one arm (or leg) is weak

SPEECH - Listen for slurred speech

TIME - Call 911

Strokes can happen in anyone regardless of age, race or sex but some people are at greater risk.

Those people include the following:

Older adults – the chance of having a stroke doubles every 10 years after age 55

People with a parent, grandparent, or sibling who had a stroke

People who have had a previous stroke, TIA, or heart attack

People who are overweight or inactive

People with high blood pressure, high cholesterol, diabetes, heart disease, or sickle cell disease Smokers and heavy alcohol users

People with African American, Latin American, Native American, and Alaska Native backgrounds
You may reduce your risk of stroke by limiting alcohol and tobacco products, eating a healthy
diet, maintaining a healthy weight and being physically active. Working with your doctor to prevent or
manage health conditions such as diabetes, high blood pressure, high cholesterol, coronary artery
disease, and atrial fibrillation may also reduce stroke risk.

If you think that you or someone you know is having a stroke or TIA, do not delay. Dial 911 right away!

The Stroke coordinator mentioned how some people will phone their doctor first to see if they should go to the hospital. This will cause an unnecessary delay as you may wait a few hours for a return call. Now you have used up valuable time of the 4-hour window. Calling 911 will send trained medical help to begin your evaluation before you get to the hospital. EMS will call ahead to begin the "stroke protocol". This allows you to receive your scan quickly and the medication you need can be administered promptly.

Stroke is the fifth leading cause of death in the United States and a major cause of serious disability. Every 40 seconds someone in the United States has a stroke. Remember the quicker you receive medical attention the better chance you have of a full recovery. I have stroke risk cards available in the office. If anyone is interested in assessing their stroke risk, please let me know and I will get it to you.

Did you know? If you soak orange peels in vinegar for two weeks in a sealed mason jar, then pour the vinegar into a spray bottle, you can use this for cleaning or bug spray and it's great to eliminate ants.

Plants that keep bugs away:
Rosemary – fleas, ticks
Marigold – mosquitoes, aphids
Basil – mosquitoes, houseflies
Lavender- moths, fleas, flies, mosquitoes
Catnip – mosquitoes
Peppermint – spiders, mosquitoes, ants
