From Fr. Tim's Desk

"Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect." Matthew 5:48

"Be perfect as your heavenly Father is perfect." A commandment? expectation? A challenge? Be perfect. Tough words to hear. During the month of February we read through Matthew's account of Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, a set of rules and exhortations preached to the masses on a hillside in Galilee that tell us not what to believe, but rather what to do. They tell us how to lead our lives as God and his Son our Savior would have us do. And much of what Jesus tells us seems to be counterintuitive, even unnatural. You have heard it said an eye for an eye and a tooth for tooth, but I say if someone strikes you on the cheek then turn the other cheek so that they may strike it also. You have heard it said love your neighbor and hate your enemy, but I say love your enemies and pray for The Sermon on the Mount contains so many lofty ethics and uncompromising demands that no one could ever perfectly meet all of the strict demands of the sermon. But that is the point. There has only ever been one perfect human being, and it is he who preached on the hillside 2000 years ago. Jesus describes what is in his heart and in his Father's heart. In this season of Epiphany, in this season of making himself known, our Lord Jesus Christ is telling us what it means to be perfect, what it means to be like God. Why? So that we might be like Him. His Sermon on the Mount is the standard toward which every one of his disciples should strive, even though they can never fully attain the standard until He comes again.

As Christians we are called to become new creations in Christ, to live into the persons that our Lord and Savior would have us be. As our faith matures we find ourselves more and more able to build upon the sure foundation of Christ. High Cholesterol – Cholesterol is a type of fat in your blood. Your cells need cholesterol and your body makes all it needs. But you also get cholesterol from food you eat.

If you have too much cholesterol, it starts to build up in your arteries. This is called hardening of the arteries, or atherosclerosis. It usually is a slow process that gets worse as you get older. This reduces the amount of blood that gets to your body tissues, including your heart. This can lead to serious problems, including heart attack and stroke.

Cholesterol is considered high, 240 and above. It is best if your cholesterol is less than 200. High cholesterol doesn't make you sick. By the time you find out you have it, it may already be clogging your arteries. So it is very important to start treatment even though you may feel fine.

Many things can cause high cholesterol, including:

- The foods you eat. Eating too much saturated fat, trans fat and cholesterol can raise your cholesterol. Saturated fat and cholesterol are in foods that come from animals (such as meats, whole milk, egg yolks, butter and cheese). Trans fats are in many packaged and snack foods, such as cookies, crackers and chips.
- Being overweight.
- Being inactive.
- Age. Cholesterol starts to rise after age 20.
- · Family history.
- Overall health. Diseases such as hypothyroidism can raise cholesterol.

If you have high cholesterol, you need treatment to lower your risk of heart attack and stroke. The two main treatments are lifestyle changes and medicine.

Some lifestyle changes are important for everyone with high cholesterol. Your doctor will probably suggest you:

- Eat a heart-healthy diet that includes plenty of fish, fruits, vegetables, beans, high-fiber grains and breads, and healthy oils like olive oil.
- Lose weight, if you need to. Losing just 5-10 lbs. can lower your cholesterol.
- Get regular exercise on most, if not all, days of the week. Walking is great exercise that most people can do. A good goal is 30 minutes or more a day.
- Don't smoke.

Changing old habits may not be easy, but it is very important to help you live a healthier and longer life. Having a plan can help. Start with small steps. For example, commit to adding one fruit or one vegetable a day for a week. Instead of having dessert, take a short walk.

Fire Safety Cooking-Cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires in America. Many older adults also experience burn-related injuries during cooking. Prevent fires and burns by being watchful and alert when you cook.

- Don't cook if you are sleepy, have consumed alcohol or have taken medicine or drugs that make you drowsy.
- Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- If you are simmering, baking, roasting or boiling food, check it regularly.
 Remain in the home while food is cooking and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- Turn pot handles away from the stoves edge.
- Keep cooking surfaces clean and free from anything that can catch fire.
- Never lean over a lit burner.
- Wear short, close-fitting or tightly rolled sleeves while cooking. Loose clothing can catch fire if it touches a gas flame or an electric burner.
- Check the kitchen after you finish cooking. Make sure the oven, burners and other appliances are off.
- If a fire starts, stay calm and get out. Once out call 911 from a cell phone or a neighbor's phone. Have an outside meeting place a safe distance in front of your house where first responders can see you.

The photoelectric smoke alarms are designed to give reliable early warning of the presence of smoke where both audible and visual alarms are required. These smoke detectors provide a flashing strobe light when activated. Ideal for the deaf and hard of hearing. Meets ADA requirements.
