From Fr. Tim's Desk

"What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works?" - James 2:14

There is an ancient Japanese folk religion called Koshin whose followers believe a heavenly being keeps track of everything they do, the good and the bad. This being, however, is not capable of direct contact with his followers so while the followers sleep an internal messenger leaves their bodies and reports to the heavenly being. Of course, for those who have done nothing but good deeds they get a good night's sleep. But for those who have done nothing or have done bad deeds there is no sleep at all. Besides staying awake the Koshin believe that there is another way to prevent their internal messenger from reporting back and it is a sculpture found in every Koshin temple, three monkeys sitting side by side in slightly different postures, Mizaru, Kikazaru, and Iwazaru. Mizaru assumes a posture covering his eyes. Kikazaru assumes a posture covering his ears. Iwazaru assumes a posture covering his mouth. You know them by their English translations "See no evil", "Hear no evil", and "Speak no evil." The Koshin believe that Mizaru, Kikazaru and Iwazaru have the ability to prevent their internal messenger from seeing, or hearing, or speaking about any of the bad deeds they might do and if their internal messenger cannot see, or hear, or speak about their bad deeds, then of course they have nothing to fear.

In today's culture we typically use the "see no evil, hear no evil, speak no evil" metaphor to describe someone on the sidelines, someone who doesn't want to be involved, or someone who willfully turns a blind eye to injustice or immorality. Clearly this is not the type of person Saint James exhorts us to be. We who claim the faith of Jesus are reminded that to believe in Jesus is to LISTEN, and SEE, and LIVE, and ACT, and SPEAK according to the great commandment to love your neighbors as yourself. The Christian described by Saint James is not one sitting on the sidelines watching life go by.

For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me. I was naked and you gave clothing, I was sick and you cared for me, I was in prison and you visited me. And we may ask, Lord when did we see you hungry and fed you, or thirsty and gave you drink? And when was it we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you? And the Lord will answer us, truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of my family, you did it to me.

The Christian described by Saint James is one whose faith in Jesus is a faith that is lived, a faith that bears fruit in actions, actions of kindness and mercy and love. The Christian described by Saint James is one who shows no partiality and makes no distinction between rich and poor, because the kingdom of God does not belong to those who accumulate the greatest wealth in their earthly lives, but rather the kingdom of God belongs to those whose treasure is laid up in heaven through those same acts of kindness, and mercy, and love.

NEWS FROM MARION C. PRICE TRUST FUND

Scam – Scammers are using caller ID spoofing technology to impersonate the phone numbers of local businesses, neighbors and even you! Watch out for this wacky twist on the classic phishing phone scam. (phishing – the activity of defrauding an online account holder of financial information by posing as a legitimate company).

Your phone rings, and you look at the caller ID. You recognize the number. It may be from a local business or a neighbor down the street. But in strange twist, you might even see your own name and number on the caller ID screen.

You answer the phone and it's a robo call. Victims have reported several different phishing scams. In one common version, a recording prompts you to verify your credit card number under the guise of lowering your interest rates.

With many people rejecting calls from unfamiliar numbers, scammers are increasingly posing as familiar businesses, government organizations or people. Scammers purchase lists of phone numbers and use spoofing technology to trick potential victims into picking up the phone. Posing as your own phone number is great for shock value and for ensuing the number isn't blocked.

What to do if a scammer calls: Hang up!!! Don't press any numbers and do not call the scammer back. Don't trust caller ID - never give out any financial information if you did not initiate the call, do not provide bank account, credit card or social security numbers over the phone.

Memory Boosters – although most people accept that some memory loss occurs with aging, it is also possible to take proactive steps to protect memory. As a general rule, what is healthy for the body is also good for the brain – and for your memory.

- 1. The brain is vulnerable to wear and tear over time. Eating foods rich in antioxidants, B Vitamins or omega 3 fatty acids can help preserve brain health, memory and thinking into old age. Brain-friendly foods include berries, walnuts, fish, dark leafy greens, turmeric, spinach and orange juice.
- 2. Many brain experts use the phrase "what's good for the heart is good for the brain". People who have heart disease struggle with memory and cognition. The longer someone has had heart disease, the worse their cognitive abilities. Focus on: controlling blood pressure, cholesterol levels, and blood sugar, limit alcohol consumption and quit smoking.
- 3. Increasing the amount of light that people with dementia are exposed to each day improves their memory and cognitive abilities. Seeking out light first thing in the morning helps set the body's circadian rhythm and apparently, improves memory.
- 4. Aim for 6-8 hours of sleep a night, try to keep the same sleep schedule on weekdays and weekends to improve the quality of your sleep.
- 5. Visualization and association are both helpful when trying to remember names and details. Placing a calendar in a prominent location, writing down everything in a notebook that contains all your to-dos and lists and always leaving important items such as glasses and keys in easy to see places.

Medicare helps cover certain medical services and supplies in hospitals. If you have both Medicare Part A (Hospital Insurance) and Medicare Part B (Medical Insurance), you can get the full range of Medicare-covered services in a hospital.

If you believe you are being discharged from a hospital too soon, you have the right to immediate review by the Beneficiary and Family Centered Care Quality Improvement Organization (BFCC-QIO) in your area.

You may be able to stay in the hospital while the BFCC-QIO reviews your case. The hospital can't force you to leave before the BFCC-QIO reaches a decision.

Within two days of your admission and prior to your discharge, you should get a notice called "An Important Message from Medicare about Your Rights". If you don't get this notice, ask for it. This notice lists the BFCC-QIO's contact information and explains:

- Your right to get all medically necessary hospital services
- Your right to be involved in any decisions that the hospital, your doctor or anyone else makes about your hospital services and to know who will pay for them
- Your right to get the services you need after you leave the hospital
- Your right to appeal a discharge decision and the steps for appealing decision
- The circumstances under which you will or won't have to pay for charges for continuing to stay in the hospital
- Information on your right to get a detailed notice about why your covered services are ending

If the BFCC-QIO decides that you are being discharged too soon, Medicare will continue to cover your hospital stay as long as medically necessary (except for applicable coinsurance or deductions).

If the BFCC-QIO decides that you are ready to be discharged and you met the deadline for requesting a fast appeal, you won't be responsible for paying the hospital charges (except for applicable coinsurance or deductibles) incurred through noon of the day after the BFCC-QIO gives you the decision.
